To meet current consumer demand, more truckers are on the road, making safety more important than ever before.



Minimizing Accident Risk

Post-pandemic supply chain issues and the increasing reliance on 2-day or sameday delivery have put a measurable strain on the transportation of goods. To meet consumer demand, more truckers are on the road working longer hours—making driver safety more important than ever before.

From a cost perspective, the expenses incurred due to accidents can be staggering. In 2021, The National Safety Council estimated that the average cost of a truck or car accident is approximately \$1.8M in the event of a death and \$160,000 for a disabling injury. For commercial motor vehicles, that cost jumps to \$5 to \$7M for a fatality and \$280,000 for an injury.

In this white paper, we cover 3 strategies for encouraging good driving behavior and minimizing risk of accident.

Training and Education

Training drivers on proper driving techniques during their onboarding as well as on a regular basis is critical to ensuring good habits are employed while on the job. Every month at Kenco, we require our drivers to complete an interactive training video from one of the most recognized online safety platforms,

and we train our drivers on an industry standard commercial driving system known as the Smith System's 5 Keys. One of the five rules encourages drivers to "aim high in steering", focusing their attention high so they can see the whole road, not just a few feet in front of them.

5 Keys to Defensive Driving 1

Key 1: Aim High in Steering®

A 15-second eye lead time provides advanced warning of dangerous situations. Good decisions cannot be made without adequate time to evaluate your driving environment.

Key 2: Get the Big Picture®

Maintain a minimum of four seconds following distance. Position your vehicle to maximize visibility. Scan at least one of your mirrors every five to eight seconds.

Key 3: Keep Your Eyes Moving®

Avoid focusing on any object for more than two seconds. Active eyes enable you to get and keep your big picture.

Key 4: Leave Yourself an Out®

Surround yourself with space. Your safest position in traffic is where the fewest potential conflicts exist.

Key 5: Make Sure They See You®

Seek eye contact. Use your warning devices at the proper time.



When driving,

the average driver looks 3 and 6 seconds ahead of them. We train our professional drivers to look 12 to 18 seconds ahead, giving them the visibility and space to see what they need and act accordingly.




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Implementing New Technologies

Newer trucking fleets are equipped with the latest advancements in safe driving technology, preventing dozens of potential accidents. One of the most impactful innovations that has come into play is inward and outward facing cameras. Kenco employs these cameras in our SmartDrive system, outfitted in our trucking fleet. Kenco also uses one of the top 3 rated on-board camera systems that utilizes outward facing cameras to detect objects in front of or to the side of the truck. These systems prevent incidents by detecting objects approaching too closely, and automatically slowing the truck down (if it's in an 'active' setting) or setting off an alert for the driver (if it's in a 'passive' setting). These systems also interact with the SmartDrive cameras to capture video of the events.

Inward facing cameras are used to observe driver behavior, alerting them of any concerns in real-time, as well as for coaching opportunities and rewarding good driving practices after a route has been completed.







Creating the Right Culture

A key ingredient to promoting safe driving habits is building a culture where drivers feel empowered through inclusion and collaboration. Kenco's drivers play a critical role in not only transporting customer goods, but also in the overall success of the company. At Kenco, we allow drivers to take an active approach in their own evaluations, allowing them to review their own videos to identify areas where they excel and where they can improve—similar to an athlete and coach critiquing performance via video replays. Allowing drivers to help to

test, evaluate, and roll out new technologies to the larger team would be another way to build a culture where they are included in the decisionmaking process.
